Our congregation loves music, and we have incorporated modern, traditional and classic Jewish music into our High Holiday worship. We are thrilled that this year to welcome Student Cantor Daniel Geigerman, who along with Ellen Asherman and the High Holiday Choir, will lead the music for our upcoming High Holidays.

Born and raised in St. Louis, Missouri, Daniel Geigerman received his Bachelor of Arts in Music from Webster University in St. Louis in 2012. He is finishing his third year as a cantorial student in the Debbie Friedman School of Sacred Music at Hebrew Union College - Jewish Institute of Religion.

From 2008 to 2015, Daniel worked at his childhood temple, Congregation Shaare Emeth in St. Louis Missouri, in many different capacities - music teacher, religious school teacher, cantorial assistant, camp song leader, and occasionally cantorial soloist. During that time, his love of Judaism flourished and matured, and he came to realize that the cantorate was his calling. He delights in teaching Judaism to both children and adults; especially through music.

Student Cantor Geigerman will be joining us for Selichot on Saturday evening September 1st. Selichot is held on the Saturday evening prior to Rosh HaShanah, but it must be at least four days before Rosh HaShanah begins, so this year it will be on the first, with Rosh HaShanah starting on the 9th.

Selichot is a wonderful way to get ourselves ready for the upcoming High Holidays. I hope you will join me in warmly welcoming him to Temple Israel.

Wouldn't it be nice to have beautiful posters to go along with these, especially, to help publicize special events, as well as upcoming holiday celebrations?

Amongst the members of Temple Israel, there is a wealth of talent in drawing, painting and other visual arts. As Communications Chair, I would like to have a task force of visual artists that could be available to design attractive, compelling posters to publicize our events and special activities. This would be done well in advance of the date of activities to allow for time to distribute and post these works of poster art. 

With Professor Shawna Dolansky

The Problem with "Patriarchy": Biblical Women in Law and Narrative

Saturday, July 14, 2018

10:15 am service followed by a lecture

Many people are quick to condemn the Bible as irredeemably "patriarchal." Certainly the world described therein looks very different from our own in terms of gender equality. For example, in Parashat Mattot we learn that some women's vows are subject to veto by fathers and husbands. In her Dvar Torah, Shawna Dolansky will discuss why this was the case, and what this may tell us about the status of women in the ancient Israelite context that the text reflects. While it was in many ways a man's world, Dolansky will argue that the term "patriarchy" misses the nuance and complexity of gender relations in ancient Israel. After lunch, Shawna will expand on the theme of women in ancient Israel in a lecture focused on the matriarchs and women of Bereshit. While the Israelites may seem oppressively patriarchal by our standards, the pivotal nature of women's roles within the biblical narrative is unprecedented in the larger context of the ancient Near East.

Dr. Shawna Dolansky is an award-winning Instructor in the Religion Program and the College of the Humanities at Carleton University, specializing in the study of Biblical Israel and early Judaism. She is the author of two books and numerous articles, and is a frequent contributor to online public scholarship on the Bible and ancient Israel.

My children loved **All-of-a-kind Family** by Sydney Taylor. It's the story of an immigrant Jewish family living in the Lower East Side of Manhattan in the early 1900s. The book describes the everyday life of five sisters growing up in a happy, crowded home—chores, trips to the library, spending their pocket money-- and a few unusual experiences, such as when they escape stifling, innercity heat on a trip to the beach and when they are quarantined because of scarlet fever. The family celebrates the rituals of Jewish family life: preparing for Shabbat, Passover and other holidays. One of my favourite stories is how the mother makes a game out of dusting (quite a feat) by hiding buttons for the children to find.

The book is aimed at children eight years old and up. It's available at the Ottawa Public Library, and the Greenberg Library. If you like it, All-of-a-kind Family is the first in a series, so there is more to enjoy.





Imre Rosenberg Lecture Review

Struggles of Holocaust survivors in Canada relevant to immigrants now, says speaker at Temple Israel's Rosenberg Lecture

The author of "Holocaust Survivors in Canada" says she learned about "rehabilitation and resilience in trauma" that is relevant to today.

"In the wake of the current refugee crisis, our days and

our hearts can surely open wider," said Adara Goldberg, who gave the Dr. Imre Y. Rosenberg Lecture at Temple Israel May 10th.

The Jewish community can show compassion to newcomers, she said, and lessons gleaned from the past can help the immigrants of the future.

Her study represents the first comprehensive analysis of the resettlement, integration and acculturation experience of survivors in early postwar Canada. Her book "Holocaust Survivors in Canada: Exclusion, Inclusion, Transformation, 1947-1955" is published by University of Manitoba Press.

After WWII, 35,000 Jewish Holocaust survivors arrived in Canada. The unprecedented scale of the relief effort required for the survivors challenged both the established Jewish community and resettlement agents alike, she said.

A longstanding tradition at Temple Israel, the lectures have been endowed by Dr. Truda Rosenberg, a Holocaust survivor, in memory of her late husband, Dr. Imre Rosenberg.

Dr. Goldberg said it was an honour to be delivering the lecture and to meet Truda Rosenberg, turning 96, earlier in the afternoon at Hillel Lodge.

She began her talk with thanks to the Holocaust survivors who shared their time and memories. "I dedicate any talk I do to these men and women," said Dr. Goldberg, a Toronto native, who received her PhD from the Strassler Centre for Holocaust and Genocide Studies, Clark University. She is currently the director of the Holocaust Resource Centre at Kean University in New Jersey.

She gave examples of the long journeys of Holocaust survivors who ended up in Canada, and noted that in Ottawa the book "None is Too Many," published in 1983, drew attention to the topic.

"None is Too Many: Canada and the Jews of Europe 1933-1948" co-authored by Canadian historians Irving Abella and Harold Troper, described Canada's restrictive immigration policy towards Jewish refugees during the Holocaust years.

Describing herself as a "social historian", Dr. Goldberg said her interest in people and Jewish history began in grade five in suburban Toronto when she had to write about a hero, and chose Hannah Senesh, a poet who was a paratrooper trained to rescue Jews during the Holocaust. Even today, she said, she is haunted by her story.

Dr. Goldberg went on to read young adult Holocaust history, volunteer at Baycrest Centre where she heard the stories of Holocaust survivors, and then decided to "up my historical training." After learning about an American study on their Holocaust survivors, she found that there was "a glaring hole" in the story of Holocaust survivors in Canada, and she decided to undertake that topic at the age of 22. "I knew if I wanted to interview Holocaust survivors I had to do it now. I knew the archives would be here a few years from now, but the survivors wouldn't." She sat with people for hours until they were comfortable enough to trust her. "We were not welcomed by Canadian Jews," said one man. "They thought they were better than us. They called us Greenies" which was a derogatory term used to refer to new Jewish immigrants. However the Benevolent Society made them feel welcome and reminded them of their past life.

Some survivors were surprised she was interested in that period of their life. "Almost 70 years after the war, people were adamant I should change the topic. They were afraid of appearing ungrateful of all that had been done for them."

She said she had to come to terms with the fact that the Canadian community didn't know how to respond to the new immigrants, and also the reverse. "Human beings are complicated at the best of times...Many social workers didn't have trauma training but everyone did the best they could."

Sometimes there was misunderstanding about their urban experiences. A Polish Jew, David, told her, "They asked me if I knew how to turn on a light switch or flush a toilet."

In reply to a question at the Temple Israel event from a Jewish immigrant who wasn't a Holocaust survivor, she said "my hope is we will talk about Sephardic Jews, the large Russian community in Toronto and other groups, and that people will research and give voice to those who haven't had their voices heard."

Fran Klodawsky of Temple Israel had read Dr. Goldberg's book previously and suggested her for the lecture. "She conveyed the diversity of experience and the many different ways to think about welcoming newcomers today, and to be thoughtful in our responses to them," said Dr. Klodawsky. "reading the book, it helped me situate my parents' family. They had family to come to, but many people didn't have anyone."

"Some struggled to find their footing," said Dr. Goldberg. "Most survivors did come through, overcoming great obstacles. They contributed to Jewish life and to secular life."

Mark Walker, chair of the Rosenberg Memorial Lecture, said the research by Dr. Goldberg "will teach all of us something of what it means to be an immigrant."



Tisha B'Av July 21-22, 2018

Tishah B'Av, observed on the 9th (tishah) of the Hebrew month of Av (July 21-22, 2018), is a day of mourning the destruction of both ancient Temples in Jerusalem, In contrast to traditional streams of Judaism, liberal Judaism never has assigned a central religious role to the ancient Temple. Therefore, mourning the destruction of the Temple may not be particularly meaningful to liberal Jews. In modern times, Jews understand Tishah B'Av as a day to remember many tragedies that have befallen the Jewish people throughout history.

Traditionally, Tishah B'Av is the darkest of all days, a time set aside for fasting and mourning the destruction of both ancient Temples in Jerusalem. As on Yom Kippur, the fast extends from sundown until the following sundown. In the synagogue, the Book of Lamentations is chanted, as are kinot, which are dirges written during the Middle Ages. Sitting on low stools, a custom associated with mourning the dead, Jews read sections of the books of Jeremiah and Job, as well as passages from the Bible and the Talmud that deal with the Temples' destruction in 586 B.C.E. and 70 C.E.

Many traditional Jews begin a period of semi-mourning three weeks before Tishah B'Av on the 17th of the Hebrew month of Tamuz. It was supposedly on this day in 586 B.C.E. that the Babylonians first made an incursion into the Temple in Jerusalem. Beginning on this date, traditional Jews refrain from holding weddings, festive celebrations, or cutting their hair. The mourning intensifies on the first of Av with no meat or wine consumed, no new clothing purchased, and no shaving allowed. On the evening before Tishah B'Av, a 24-hour fast begins, and in synagogue services, the Book of Lamentations is chanted. When Tishah B'Av falls on Shabbat, its observance begins after Shabbat ends and extends into the next day.

For most liberal Jews, Tishah B'Av has faded in importance as a ritual observance, as the rebuilding of a central Temple in Jerusalem has lost its priority and significance in modern times. Although historians dispute the fact that both Temples were destroyed on this day, Tishah B'Av has become a symbol of Jewish suffering and loss. Over the centuries, other tragic events have come to be commemorated on this day, including the brutal massacres of the Crusades, the Jewish expulsion from Spain, and the Holocaust. Today, Tishah B'Av stands as a day to reflect on the suffering that still occurs in our world.
