

Growing up, I looked forward to Purim more than any other Jewish holiday. It was the one time in the year when we kids ruled the otherwise sombre sacred space of our temple's sanctuary. For generations, Purim has been a time to turn everything on its head. In the middle ages, rabbis wrote spoofs and rhymes about the characters in the Pu-

rim story. For generations, Purim has been the one time of the year when everyone can just let loose and have a good time.

This year I hope you will join us for a wonderful Purim evening. If you have young children, our Temple Israel Religious School has planned a fantastic series of Purim events and activities. The fun begins at 4:30pm. At 6pm everyone is invited to a Purim Pizza Party! (RSVP required – TIRS@templeisraelottawa.ca). Then at 7pm we will hold our Purim Shpiel and reading of the Megillah. This year our shpiel will be.... Purim Wars – and feature such wonderful characters as Darth Haman, Lei-Esther and Chaiwalker. We will intersperse reading of the Megillah throughout the Shpiel. Of course no Purim celebration would be complete without tasting some delicious Hamentashen!

One of the great Purim traditions is the noisemaker, or "Grogger". As we read the Megillah and the story of Purim unfolds, we cheer when Mordechai's name is read and use this strange musical instrument when we hear the name of the evil Haman. Some scholars believe that the Grogger comes from 13th Century France and Germany. For centuries, they have been used to engage everyone in the story of Purim.

Though most everyone likes the Grogger, in fact, one notable character, Dr. Seuss' the Grinch, does not like it one bit:

".... All the Jew girls and boys, would go to hear Megillah, and they'd make lots of noise!

Every time they hear Haman, they'd take out their toys!

And then! Oh the noise! Oh, the Noise! Noise! Noise! Noise!

That's one thing he hated! The NOISE! NOISE! NOISE! NOISE!"

Just a month after Purim, we will join together to celebrate Passover / Pesach. Our yearly opportunity to celebrate our freedom. They are so deeply appreciative of all our efforts. ### From the Pulpit



Shalom,

Angus Smith and I have spent the last three weeks in Israel. It is the first time in 12 years that I have travelled here without a structured programme. No tour to lead, no conference to attend, in practical terms no agenda to follow. Rather than script a diary about our excellent adventures I have decide to share some experiences and perceptions

We are in Jerusalem. We visit Yad L'Kashis, life line for the elderly. Everyone is a bit down. The old people are reflecting the weather it is cold and rainy and many of the peers have not shown up. We say hello to the director, Nava, who I have known for decades. She is down. Tourism, especially Jewish tourism, is non existent. That means the gift shop has few buyers and fewer tourists means less donations. The dearth of tourism is palpable here. Stores are empty, except for teenagers. Stores are closing. Angus wants an army shirt for his son. We enter an Army/Navy store. What ensues is a long discussion in Hebrew and English about a tourist who bought an expandable baton, police caliber, which he takes on his visit to the old city. He is afraid for his life. We feel no such fear, but perhaps we read the paper and realize only soldiers or West Bank settlers are targets. The holy city feels safe and sacred on Shabbat. We walk the streets nodding Shabbat Shalom to all. We have ended up in the great synagogue for Shabbat morning. The singing by the all male choir and the chazzan of a piece written by Debbie Freidman, L'DorVDor, says it all. An orthodox soul singing a melody by a bisexual woman. Peace cannot be far away. Oh yes we went to Mea shearing. Angus bought a tallit from a relative of Rabbi Berger Z'l. Small Jewish world. Just when despair of meeting anyone I know in Jerusalem, for the very first time, I run into a classmate. He tells me of another classmate who made Aliyah in '81 that needs a call. Three of us who met 45 years ago here in Jerusalem connecting once more. You could not write this kind of stuff

Four days earlier we served as volunteers on a secret Army base known as Shimshon. Now I will have to kill all who read this. We were part of the Sar El programme. Two weeks living in Army barracks, eating Army food, wearing Tzhal uniforms. If you want to feel this country go to flag raising on a Monday morning. Almost 175 teenagers forced to put away their cell phones, fix their berets, stand at attention, salute the flag and sing Hatikvah. They really don't sing, they are teenagers they would be embarrassed to sing out loud. But we ten volunteers sing loudly. Like a hockey game only the old and self confident sing out loud. The flag rises and there is a moment when we look to the mountains where we know that Lebanon is and wonder what their teenagers are doing at this moment. Are they looking to be any place but in uniform. Do they feel the imperative to protect their land with their lives, or do they simply hate us?

We go to work in the electronics laboratory. This week our bosses will be yeshiva students who have voted with their feet to be part of the country. They love this country. They just wish everybody was more religious. They laugh at my quoting Torah and when I tell them I teach Talmud. They are intrigued by Angus' work and his name. My boss decides that I look like Moses and speak Hebrew like Moses so he calls me Moses. I call him Joshua my servant. It is a wonderful two weeks in the Army we have reconditioned 200 tank commander helmets and 45 antenna vehicle mounts. We have saved the army from incompetence. We both pray that our work will never see action.

One final experience amongst many. We watched a movie on the

army base called "Under the Helmet"

It is the story of five kids training to be paratroopers. Even Angus got tears in his eyes when the kids speak about knowing that putting on the uniform is acknowledgment that they may die in battle. Kids like our kids tasked with preserving this strange, unfathomable, often self destructive, wonderful, magical, mystical place. For a moment all politics are forgotten and there is only Am Yisrael.

Angus says he wants to do this again. I'm not sure that sequels ever work but like Star Wars, Star Trek, Fast and Furious, Dumb and Dumber I might be convinced that that there is another story yet to be told.

Mr. Ziad Al Sahhar attended Friday prayers at the Cordova Mosque along with eight Temple members and was welcomed there as well

Social Action, the process of Tikun Olam, repairing the world, is one of the values we cherish at Temple Israel. Our committee needs more members and renewed leadership as the present Chairs will be retiring. Please do not hesitate to contact me through the Temple office to volunteer your time and energy on the Social Action committee or any other committee that interests you.

Members who have great ideas and experience at inviting and engaging potential members are also being sought. Statistics show that there are many non-affiliated Jews in Ottawa. Needed are creative ways to bring them into Temple Israel's sacred community. There are many ways of 'doing' Jewish, and I look forward to exploring them with you.

### **Report for Temple Bulletin on Visioning Session**

Over 30 people attended a special planning meeting on Sunday Feb 21 – the topic – **A Vision for Temple in 2020**.

After introductions by President Patsy Royer and the D'Var Torah by Rabbi Morais, Rabbi then introduced the concept of a vision statement and facilitated a group brainstorming session to identify the key words describing our Temple Israel "Vision" for 2020. Small groups then worked on 10 different draft vision statements, which were reviewed and once posted on the wall, were voted on by those in attendance to determine the top 3 favourites for closer discussion and analysis. In this work, participants were both positive and creative and lots of great suggestions were articulated.

Many suggested vision statements included similar key words such as "diverse", "community", "celebrate", "egalitarian", "inclusive", "reform" "spiritual", "be jewish" "sacred values", "meaningful connection" "engagement" and many more.

The Strategic Planning Committee will consider all proposed statements and key words and attempt to craft a more succinct vision statement to review at a later date. This will be a challenge and require feed back from the community. Stay tuned!

The second phase of the afternoon involved the group in one of 3 discussion groups to discuss ways to improve issues around 3 key strategic objectives identified by the Strategic Planning Committee. The three objectives are:

Membership Governance Communication

After a good discussion, each group presented through a volunteer spokesperson to all those in attendance. Notes were kept for the strategic planning committee to take back and integrate into their ongoing work.

Much discussion, laughter and hard work was shared. The 'As-washeard' record of the day is posted on the Temple Members' Web Site in the Strategic Planning Committee section. This includes the agenda, presentation, 2005 Temple Vision, key vision words, the draft vision statements, and the proposed strategies.

Special thanks go to the organizers, which included members of the Strategic Planning committee, Temple staff, and particularly the small group leaders – both facilitators and reporters, some of whom volunteered on short notice. We hope all who attended found the session useful and engaging.

The work continues with the Strategic Planning Committee who will be following up with polishing a final vision statement and proposing a strategic implementation plan for Board approval this spring that addresses the identified governance-membership-communications issues.



### **Books and Bagels 2016**

Mark these dates on your calendar!
A Bagel Breakfast at 9:30am is followed by the book review and discussion.
Pre-registration is not required, nor is it necessary to have read the book to enjoy the session. There is no charge but a voluntary donation to cover the cost of breakfast is appreciated.

Sunday, March 13, 2016 Shanghai Legacy by Marion Cuba will be reviewed by Rabbi Robert Morais of Temple Israel. Rabbi Morais has chosen this book because of his family connection to Shanghai: his grandparents lived there during this period and it is where his mother was born.

During the Nazi era, nearly 20,000 Jews sought safety in the unlikely haven of Shanghai-the one place that would have them without a visa. This is a novel of historical fiction and chronicles this pocket of time of 1938-1945. The book weaves actual events with an imagined mother-daughter drama of dark secrets, generational conflict, and the search for love and fulfillment.

**Sunday, April 10, 2016 Ally by Michael B. Oren** will be reviewed by Rabbi Steven Garten, Rabbi Emeritus of Temple Israel.

Michael B. Oren's memoir of his time as Israel's ambassador to the United States—a period of transformative change for America and a time of violent upheaval throughout the Middle East—provides a frank, fascinating look inside the special relationship between America and its closest ally in the region.

**Sunday, May 1, 2016 City of Abraham by Edward Platt** will be reviewed by Howard Alper. Howard has been a member of Temple Israel since 1975. He is spearheading the Global Research Excellence initiative by the Governor General of Canada. He was Chair of the Government of Canada's Science, Technology and Innovation Council during 2007-2015.

The City of Abraham is a journey through one of the world's most divided cities – Hebron, the only place in the West Bank where Palestinians and Israelis live side by side. It begins with a hill called Tel Rumeida, the site of ancient Hebron, where the patriarch Abraham – father of the Jews and the Arabs – was supposed to have lived when he arrived in the Promised Land. Through a mixture of travel writing, reportage and interviews, Platt tells the history of the hill and the city in which it stands, and explores the mythic roots of the struggle to control the land.

Most books are available through the Ottawa Public Library and the Greenberg Families Library at the JCC. The Malca Pass Library and the Temple Israel Library also carry some of these titles.
