From the Pulpit

The first time I travelled to Israel was in the late 1980's. At the time if you wanted to call home, it involved finding a pay phone, calling the special number to reach the international operator, being lucky enough to get a free line, have the operator place your call and hope and pray that the person you were calling would be home! Since that first trip I have been to Israel 16 times! Things have changed! Today, when you arrive at the

airport in Tel Aviv, you just pop an Israeli Sim Card into your mobile phone and you can call anywhere in the world.

So much has changed since that first trip. Israel has matured and grown into a thriving technological and industrial powerhouse. Last month as part of my sabbatical, I was blessed to be part of a rabbinic delegation from the Central Conference of American Rabbis. The trip was an opportunity to explore Israel as world leader in technological advancement and the world's most prolific producer of start-up companies. On our first day we looked out the hotel window in Tel Aviv to see a beautiful rainbow. The ancient symbol of God's covenant with Noah. Then it was off to visit the Tel Aviv stock exchange. There, we met some amazing entrepreneurs. People who are making purified drinking water from the humidity in the air. This is a game changer for millions of people who live in places that do not have clean drinking water. There was another related invention called Soapy, a machine that not only makes clean water but also mixes it with the right amount of soap to effectively allow people to wash their hands. In so many parts of the world people transfer illness and disease by not being able to wash their hands properly. The installation of a Soapy unit in a school in India has reduced the occurrence of illness and disease by 70% - an astounding number, considering it only costs \$500 per year to operate the unit.

Israel was born out of the refusal of our community to acknowledge the reality of the threats to its very existence. In May of 1948 David Ben Gurion stood up in a crowded hall in Tel Aviv and proclaimed the creation of the State of Israel. The last 70 years we have seen countless miraculous events that have allowed the state to not only survive but thrive! As the saying goes, if you want to see a miracle in Israel, all you need to do is wake up in the morning!

As we travelled around the country, we saw ancient Jewish cities. Places our people have lived in for millennia. Our Biblical ancestor Isaac needed water when he lived in ancient Ber Sheva, so he dug wells and found water. Today, in that very same place, Israeli innovators are following in our patriarch's footsteps and are fulfilling the needs of our modern technology and industrial corporations.

President's Message



You may have noticed some inspiring words beside the Temple Israel logo on recent weekly updates. What are these words? They make up our new Temple Vision. This new vision was revised and constructed in consultation with members of the Temple community and approved by the Board at its January 17, 2019 meeting. This vision will guide us into the future.

Speaking of the future, most of what will happen is heavily dependent on financial resources. The vast majority of Temple's operating expenses is covered by dues. We also receive an annual cheque from the Temple Israel (Ottawa) Foundation, which covers about 1.5% of our operating expenses. From time to time, we have received generous support from living congregants. Temple has also been very fortunate to have received a few generous bequests. Portions of these bequests have been used to pay off the mortgage and will be used to support other Temple activities.

We have recently been made aware of the Life and Legacy program, sponsored by the Grinspoon Foundation, that focuses on legacy gifts. Through training, support and monetary incentives, the program motivates Jewish organizations like Temple to secure legacy gifts, steward donors and integrate legacy giving in the philanthropic culture of the Jewish community. More to come on this program.

Temple members are encouraged to plan for bequests to Temple Israel to provide the financial wherewithal for shorter term and longer term capital intensive projects. These projects will also benefit from lump sum donations now from our living members.

On the other side of this discussion is the identification of wants and needs, including dollars to achieve these wants and needs. The result will be a Wish List. This Wish List could range from putting on a Kiddush to purchasing a commercial dishwasher to sponsoring a concert to supporting the building renovation to... Well, you get the idea. For example, a group of congregants, no matter what their means, can get together to share the needed financial contributions for a Wish List item, big or small. Stay tuned.

Kudos to Allan Silburt and his committee for the wonderful Yellow Ticket program held on February 10th. There was great turnout from inside and outside the Temple community, live musical accompaniment by the composer, professional picture and sound, extensive publicity using a variety of media, use of different ticket sales mechanisms, and diligent, careful financial management of this program. Congratulations for a well executed and successful event.

Our Rabbi Transition Task Force (TTF), under co-chairs Deidre Butler and Tamara Taub, is dealing diligently with the many aspects of transition, including saying goodbye

School News



A good educator always has at least one trick question in her back pocket. So the question of the day is, what is the one theme that all but maybe 2 Jewish holidays have in common? Like the commandments, the answer to this question could be positive or negative. It could be biblical or modern, seasonal or location oriented. It could be self-produced or produced by another. The answer has a wide range of interpretation (like most

things in Judaism) but could be the same for everyone. Any guesses?

The answer to my question isn't an element of monotheism but it could relate to G-d or prayer. It is relevant to all of us sometimes and only to Jewish adults at other times. Whether a plus or minus, it is said that it should be fulfilling or meaningful. It can also be colourful or monochromatic. Guesses yet?

If you guessed food, you might have changed your mind because of the fast days in our calendar. But if you think about it, they also have to do with food as both Halacha (Jewish law) and minhag (tradition) dictate the length of that fast. You still have to eat a fairly plain meal before and after whether it is a major fast like Yom Kippur or Tisha B'Av (from sundown to sundown). The customs around minor fasts (not typically observed in Reform Judaism) tell us not to eat from sunrise to sundown but breaking that fast will still mean eating at least at the end.

Why am I bringing up food? We share food as a community and as a family for holidays throughout the year including Shabbat. One example is Temple Israel's annual Chanukah dinner service and celebration featuring our Gan Yeladim (Kindergarten). Our youth (Gr. 6-12) participate in a Tu Bishvat Seder rich in Jewish mysticism and biblical context followed up later with a Chocolate Seder before Passover. Our JYG programs always include food, but nothing will be like our JYG Purim Party. FROSTY and TIRS High School students welcomed teens from Mississauga and Montreal to celebrate Shabbat with an endless supply of food not just at the Kiddush luncheon! Our little people and TIRS families enjoy Kabbalat Shabbat dinner services and TOT Shabbat dinners. And our young families create community at the annual Pizza in the Hut program at Succot and our new Post Passover Pasta Party. (see flyers).

No matter how old or young you are, I look forward to seeing you the next time we have an opportunity to eat together!

Kosovar Refugee Update - 20 years later!

Nearly twenty years have passed since Temple Israel sponsored a multi generational Kosovar refugee family, the Bullakus in their relocation to Canada. Grandparents, parents, children and cousins, the Bullaku family arrived in a foreign land with no connections, a desperately ill child who was brought from the airplane directly to CHEO, but with the warm embrace of Temple. Accommodations were found, as were medical and dental support, translation services, and many other ways of helping this family in need.

Now, they are a prosperous, loving and well integrated Canadian family - children grown, educated, married, and parents themselves. A family that remembers the hand of friendship extended in their hour of need by Temple Israel and Ottawa's Jewish community.

Saturday night, Nathalie and Richard Garber, part of that TI team a generation ago were guests of the Bullakus at a gala celebration of the 11th anniversary of Kosovo's independence. The Garbers and Bullakus have kept in touch over the years, maintaining the bonds that Temple established so many years back - keeping true to our vision statement: We strive through social action to fulfill the Mitzvot of caring for others (Gimilut Chasadim) and repairing the world (Tikun Olam).



The Weight of Ink by Rachel Kadish will be reviewed by **Rabbi Steven Garten**. Rabbi Garten is Rabbi Emeritus of Temple Israel and is a well known educator in the community.

Set in London of the 1660s and of the early twenty-first century, The Weight of Ink is the interwoven tale of two women

of remarkable intellect: Ester Velasquez, an emigrant from Amsterdam who is permitted to scribe for a blind rabbi, just before the plague hits the city; and Helen Watt, an ailing historian with a love of Jewish history.

Passover Funny

A British Jew is waiting in line to be knighted by the Queen. He is to kneel in front of her and recite a sentence in Latin when she taps him on the shoulders with her sword. However, when his turn comes, he panics in the excitement of the moment and forgets the Latin. Then, thinking fast, he recites the only other sentence he knows in a foreign language, which he remembers from the Passover seder:

"Ma nishtana ha layla ha zeh mi kol ha laylot."

Puzzled, Her Majesty turns to her advisor and whispers, "Why is this knight different from all other knights?"

Truth & Reconciliation Task Force

Temple Israel established the Task Force to address and respond to the recommendations of the Truth and Reconciliation Commission and most specifically recommendation #49 which calls upon "all religious denominations and faith groups who have not already done so to repudiate concepts used to justify European sovereignty over Indigenous lands and peoples, such as the Doctrine of Discovery and terra nullius". Our goal is to do so in a manner that is consistent with Jewish values and ethical commitments, as illustrated by the June 2015 Statement of Solidarity and Action prepared by several national Jewish organizations, including the Canadian Council of Reform Judaism.

In this undertaking we have been blessed with a wonderful and knowledgeable partner in Dr. Kahente Horn-Miller who is an assistant professor in Carleton University's School of Indigenous and Canadian Studies.

Current members of the Task Force are: Mindy Finkelstein, Eva Lazar, Dara Lithwick, Adrienne Paknadel-Powell, Lynne Oreck-Wener, Rabbi Morais and Joyce Pagurek. Building Understanding Program Continues Wampum Belt Chronicles with Darren Bonaparte **NEW DATE** Monday May 6 at 7 p.m. at Temple Israel



Wampum is how the Haudenosaunee documented their history and culture. It was the interface between native and colonist. In his presentation on January 20th, Darren will provide a historical narrative through the significance of wampum belts which were a symbol of the most solemn of commitments. He will explain the workings of a typical treaty council and the oral traditions behind each wampum.

Darren Bonaparte is a Mohawk story teller, writer and artist from Akwesasne. He has written two books Creation and Confederation: The Living History of the Iroquois; and A Lily Among Thorns: The Mohawk Repatriation of Kateri Tekahkwi:tha as well as numerous historical articles and papers. He recently wrote the libretto for Saia'tato kenhiti: Honoring Saint Kateri, a multimedia musical theater work with music by Odawa composer Barbara Croal.

This on-going work of relationship building, learning and reflection with Ottawa-area Indigenous communities will initially consist of a series of events launched in December and continuing on May 6.

We are very pleased to report that the event has been re-scheduled to take place on the evening of Monday May 6. Also confirmed is an interactive workshop, led by Craig Tiberi, with Temple Israel Religious School students on Sunday May 5.

On February 3, nine congregants braved the snow and



freezing rain to come to Temple for a brainstorming event facilitated by Mark Holzman. Three others also provided input, one via Face-Time and two others in advance. As well as the co-chairs Fran Klodawsky and Anne Alper, participants included: Dara Lith-

Temple Israel is extremely grateful to the generous donation received from the **Ekler family**.

Kurt Ekler died on November 12, 2016 in his 94th year at Hillel Lodge. Born in Hungary and brought up

in Vienna, he was a Holocaust survivor, escaping on the Kindertransport. He graduated from McGill University with B.Sc. and Ph.D. degrees before teaching Chemistry in Montreal at Loyola College and Concordia University from which he retired as Professor Emeritus. In the 1950s, Dr. Ekler was one of the first full-time Jewish professors in a Catholic teaching institution in Quebec.

Kurt Ekler was predeceased by his wife of 56 years, Helena, in 2012. Helena Ekler graduated with a BSW in1965 and MSW in 1969 and she enjoyed a successful career as a social worker.

Throughout their lives, Kurt and Helena Ekler were generous philanthropists. They established several scholarships, including scholarships at Concordia and McGill for social work, chemistry, and pre-medical studies. As well, they made posthumous donations to various organizations, including Temple Israel. The Ekler family donation has allowed our synagogue to repay its outstanding mortgage debt and to solidify our financial position for the future. We sincerely thank the Ekler family and honour their life of tzedakah.


