School News



Welcome to a new year at Temple Israel Religious School! My vision for TIRS is to create Ottawa's premier center for Jewish learning for JK through Grade 12. Your children will be a part of a positive and interactive learning environment as we partner to create the best possible Jewish education we can offer, using the most up-to-date resources for student-centered lessons and experiences.

We continue to benefit from Jewish Federation of Ottawa's P2G and Gesher Chai programs. In July, I attended the biennial Etzbah Hagalil P2G Educators' Conference in Israel for the second time. Principals and teachers from Ottawa, Winnipeg, Edmonton, Calgary and Vancouver along with our colleagues from our twin schools in the Upper Galilee came together to both learn and develop curriculum.

At this year's conference, I was able to get to know the principal and teacher of Einat Hagalil (our partner school). Anat, Nomi and I worked to develop a plan for the coming year, making some positive changes and additions beyond being pen pals. This year, "Friends Across the Sea" curriculum will come alive using Google Docs/Google Classroom, videos and more! This program focuses on Jewish Identity and Klal Yisrael (all of the Jewish people) and issues that Jewish children face all over the world. TIRS is the only supplementary school involved in this partnership program which speaks to the level of education TIRS provides and is a great source of pride for us.

We welcome our new "Shinshin," Liam, an Israeli teen between high school and the army on "Shnat Sherut" (a year volunteer service). From September to June, Liam will be working at TIRS on Sundays and Mondays and will also be attending services on Shabbat mornings at Temple Israel.

Family programming at TIRS continues this school year with Jewish holiday and Tikkun Olam themes. Every class will lead a Kabbalat Shabbat Dinner Service or Shabbat morning service. We invite families with children under the age of 6 to TOTally Shabbat (4th Friday of each month), JBaby Shabbat Play Group (1st Shabbat morning of each month) and JBaby Volunteers at Hillel Lodge (4th Thursday of each month) for children under 3. Plans are underway to create more activities for children in Grades 1-6 including a junior choir. If you are interested in joining any of these programs, please feel free to approach me any time.





Elul Reflections: On Teshuvah and Summer Camp by Dara Lithwick, Temple member & rabbinical student



Elul, the final month in the Jewish calendar, is a period of reflection and reconciliation. It is a time focused on teshuvah, literally, on returning, on drawing near to our loved ones and to God to make amends for all the ways that we may have strayed from our best selves or missed the mark over the past year.

This year Elul began on August 12th, which also happened to be the start of the last week of summer camp at magical URJ Camp George, the only Reform Jewish camp in Canada (shalom to the Temple Israel Camp George campers and alums!). I had the privilege of serving as part of the faculty during this first week of Elul/ last week of camp, and it was brilliant, not just in terms of the fun that is had at camp, but as spiritual practice to prepare for the start of 5779 at Rosh Hashanah.

It had been 23 years since I had last attended summer camp, and while I had always loved camp, as we (me, my spouse, and our two little kids) pulled up to the gates of Camp George, I was nervous. Had almost a quarter century changed who I was? What could I offer to camp? What would our kids, almost six and almost three and a half, feel about camp?

As we parked by the main lodge and got our bearings, any nerves disappeared and were replaced by a deep sense of... teshuvah. Returning. Of feeling again what it is like to be in a place of love and freedom and growth and discovery and joy in a natural setting that God must dwell in (because it is just that good). Our kids ran about excitedly, exploring the grounds and the lakefront and the chadar ochel (dining hall), and meeting other kids of fellow staff members who immediately became their best friends for the week.

Each morning at camp I blew my shofar to the tekiah led by the campers. This Elul practice calls us all to wake up, to cherish, to be present. And we lived that presence. Each day we prayed on the beach or overlooking the lake from the scenic outdoor beit tefilah, and it felt like our surroundings prayed with us. Over the week I worked with older campers on applying the lessons of the week's Torah portion to their lives at camp, and talked with younger campers about using our Judaism to tackle social justice issues facing our world.

As we prepared for Shabbat, both my partner and I felt more ourselves than we had felt in a long time. We had returned. We looked around at the campers already becoming community leaders, living a vibrant and compassionate Judaism nurtured at camp, and we knew that the future is in good hands. And finally, watching our own kids play, learn and wonder - just as we did (way back when we were little) - was about as good as it gets. Wishing all a shanah tovah u metukah!

Rosh Hashanah Customs

lacktrian ore than many other Jewish holidays, the High Holidays take place in the synagogue. But these synagogue-based holidays can be enhanced through home rituals. Here are some ideas, old and new, for bringing the lessons and themes of Rosh Hashanah into your home.

As with most Jewish holidays, food is the focus of home celebrations of Rosh Hashanah. Families and friends gather



for extended meals, include traditional foods such as apples and challah dipped in honey. Honey, a symbol of the wish for a sweet new year, also appears in other holiday foods, such as tayglach (a honey and nut pastry) and honey cake. Challah, normally braided, is

baked round as a reminder of the never-ending cycle of

In some families, it is traditional to serve the head of a fish or lamb in the hope that everyone at the table will be at the "head" and not at the "tail" of whatever they do in the new year.

On the second night of Rosh Hashanah, it is common to eat a new fruit- a fruit that participants have not tasted for a long time. This tradition has become a way to literally taste the newness of the year, by enjoying an



unfamiliar food. Often, a pomegranate is used as the new fruit, as the pomegranate is said to have 613 seeds, corresponding to the 613 mitzvot (commandments).

The tradition of eating a new fruit need not, however, be restricted to pomegranates. Instead, this ritual can be an excuse for scouting out the "exotic fruit" section of the produce department, or exploring fruit markets to find fruits that family members have not before tasted.

A number of other food-based rituals can also enliven the home celebration of Rosh Hashanah.

Sephardic communities have developed a Rosh Hashanah seder, which revolves around the eating of symbolic foods and the recitation of prayers that transform these foods into wishes for the coming year.

Many of these prayers are based on Hebrew puns involving the food in question. For instance, the prayer before eating a date (tamar in Hebrew) includes the phrase "yitamu hataim"— may the wicked cease. Before eating pumpkin or squash (k'ra'a in Hebrew), Sephardic Jews say "yikaru l'fanekha z'khuyoteinu"– may our good deeds call out our merit before you.

Other symbolic foods include leeks and onions, which are associated with the Exodus from Egypt; beets, whose Aramaic name silka, similar to the Hebrew salak (go away) is used to express the hope that our enemies disappear; and peas or beans, mentioned in the Talmud as ruviah, a word that sounds like the Hebrew "to increase," and therefore indicates a desire for increased blessings in the new year.

The foods eaten and puns used change from community to community, according to the types of vegetables available and the inherited traditions. In planning your own Rosh Hashanah menu, you can be creative in developing your own English puns. For instance, you might eat raisins to commit to raisin' your expectations for the new year" or peas in the hope of increased peace. Your salad might be a chance to say, "Lettuce find happiness in the new year," or "We will beet any obstacles that come our way." Children can be involved in creating puns and devising a menu based on these newly symbolic foods.

Preparation for Rosh Hashanah, as well as the days between Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur, can also include discussions of the meaning of teshuvah (repentance) and family resolutions for the new year.

This may be a time for siblings, parents and children to apologize to one another for incidents during the previous year and to make promises for the coming year.

Many people have the custom of sending Rosh Hashanah cards to loved ones. Children can be involved in choosing or drawing these cards, and older children may also write personal messages in some of the cards.

The first day of Rosh Hashanah includes the Tashlich ceremony, in which we symbolically toss away our sins by throwing bread crumbs into a body of running water. To make this ritual more concrete, you might help your children to make a list beforehand of the things they want to throw away. You can also turn the preparation for Tashlich into an art project. Children can paint, with watercolors, what they wish to get rid of in the coming year. When you float the drawings in water, these unwanted habits will magically disappear.

To emphasize the newness of the year, you might try doing something new right before or after the holiday. For instance, you might learn a new game, visit a place you've never been, or try a new hobby. Many people buy new clothes for the holiday and wear these clothes for the first time on Rosh Hashanah. Enjoying a new experience or acquiring new knowledge can spark a conversation about what else new might happen in the coming year.

Rosh Hashanah can be an opportunity for reflecting on the year that has passed and setting goals for the year to come. Taking time for such reflection can make the themes of the holiday come alive for the entire family.




