Marching Towards the New Year With Hope

Let me begin by offering a very sincere todah rabah - thank you! Zach, Jacob and I are so grateful for the warm welcome that we've received at Temple Israel. As we can all appreciate, moving to a new city is not easy. Nevertheless, your warmth and generos-

ity have helped to smooth this important transition. We're thrilled to now call Ottawa home. If we haven't yet met, I'm eager to connect with you soon.

The Jewish year of 5780 is almost here. As is the case with most beginnings, we greet this new year with excitement and anxiety, hope and fear. What will this year offer? FROM THE PRINCIPAL'S DESK



Welcome to another year at our newly restored Temple Israel Religious School. TIRS is Ottawa's premier center for Jewish learning from birth through Grade 12 and we are back on track for a fantastic year ahead.

We are kicking off the new year with a family program on the theme of "What's in a Name?" on Wednesday,

September 4th from 4:30 – 6:00 pm. In addition, FROSTY, JYG and TIRS have joined together for a Challah and Honey fundraiser to support family and youth programming in the coming year. Don't forget to order!

We continue to benefit from Jewish Federation of Ottawa's P2G and Gesher Chai programs. Our bond with Einat Hagalil Democratic School in the north of Israel has strengthened over the last 3 years. In the past, Morah Malkah was the lead teacher. Morah Jenny joined her about 2 years ago and will be taking on that role for our Grades 5 and 6 classes. We are very proud to be the only supplementary school in Canada that has a partner school in this program. Our students are just as excited to receive mail from their Israeli pen pals as they are to send their own letters and videos. Some of the students have even been communicating by WhatsApp, Skype and email outside of class time. This partnership has truly advanced the notion of Klal Yisrael (unity of the Jewish people) for our students.

I look forward to another year where each grade will be active participants in a Kabbalat Shabbat or Shabbat morning service. In addition, younger students will have opportunities to learn and interact with older students throughout the year (i.e. Simchat Torah). Please plan to support all of our students at this monthly service.

Programming for families, children and youth continues this school year with Jewish holiday and Tikkun Olam (repairing the world) themes. We invite families with young children to monthly programs like TOTally Shabbat (4th Friday), JBaby Shabbat Play Group (2nd Shabbat) and JBaby Oneg Shabbat at Hillel Lodge (1st Friday).

For children in Grades 3-8, Junior Choir returns monthly as well as JYG (Junior Youth Group) for grades 6-8 or 5-8. Morah Ranit provides 2-3 JYG programs like Dungeons & Dragons (4th Sunday) and a NEW JBotics program (2nd Wednesday) thanks to a microgrant received from Jewish Federation of Ottawa.

For our high school students, we have FROSTY (Federation of Reform Ottawa Senior Temple Youth) who travel with their Advisor, Lisa Rossman, to other camps and cities within the North East Lakes region of NFTY as well as local programming. Sometimes, JYG and FROSTY get together for "ALL YOUTH" (Grades 6-12) programs like Tu Bishvat & Chocolate Seders. For more information, please contact me at any time.

NEW!! This year, we are offering 2 certificate programs:

1. Madrichim Program for High School/University students. This program will teach our TAs how they can better serve the teachers and students they work with and will be facilitated by Morah Karli.

2. Grade 11-12: This once per month class (1st Monday) will delve into the world of Jewish and Israeli approach to Jewish law (Halacha), society and government from a Talmudic and modern perspective.

With all of the great things going on in our school, it is no surprise that our enrollment continues to grow. At the end of the last school year we had over 90 students. With the growing interest for 3 year-olds to attend, We are anticipating a preschool program on Sunday mornings for 2- and 3-year-olds in the near future. Please let me know if you are interested!

I am always open to receive feedback as we work together to ensure success for our children in a safe, inviting, inclusive, and engaging school.







Before the Holocaust, Yiddishland was a vast expanse of Eastern Europe numbering some 11 million people.



Socialists, Communists, Bundists, Zionists, Trotskyists, manual workers and intellectuals.....this book traces the struggles of these militants, their singular trajectories, their oscillation between great hope and doubt, their lost illusions--a red and Jewish gaze on the history of the twentieth century.

Sunday November 3, 2019 - 2PM "The Ancient Law"

Alicia Svigals - Violin, Donald Sosin - Piano

After a sell out performance of The Yellow Ticket in February, we are thrilled to welcome back New York based Alicia Svigals, co-founder of the Grammy Award winning Klezmatics. Alicia and Donald will perform Alicia's original score to the screening of the 1923 silent film "The Ancient Law". The film tells the story of the son of a shtetl Rabbi who leaves his home to pursue his dream of becoming a stage actor in Vienna at the turn of the 20th century.

Sunday December 1, 2019 - 2PM "On Wings of Song"

Yosuke Kawasaki, Jessica Linnebach - Violin, Jethro Marks - Viola, Paul Marleyn - Cello

This year we also welcome back this all-star Ottawa based chamber ensemble featuring works by Erwin Schulhoff (duo for violin and cello), Felix Mendelssohn (String Quartet Op.80) and Samuel Barber (Adagio for Strings). With their very tight touring and performance schedules, we are very fortunate to have booked them for our venue this year.

Sunday December 15, 2019 - 2PM "Cellobration - From Baroque to Rock and Roll" Chloe Dominguez, Paul Marleyn, Daniel Parker, Raphael Weinroth Brown - cello

This will be a treat for Cello lovers. These musicians have put together a really fun program of short pieces arranged for four cellos that span the spectrum from Bach to Metallica with various stops along the way.

Sunday March 29, 2020 - 2PM 'Hot Club Jazz"

Justin Duhaime's Gypsy Muse with special guest William Lamoureux - violin

Take yourself back in time to Paris in the 1930's when the famous Hot Club featured the likes of Stephane Grappelli and Django Rienhart. That's the feel of this band. Jazz on these acoustic instruments has a unique sensibility that is fun, soulful and always approachable to ears less familiar with the jazz category. While still quite popular in Europe, this style often takes a back seat to the brassier avant garde at local jazz festivals. Toronto based William Lamouruex returns to Ottawa to join the band to deliver a performance that is sure to have your foot tapping.

Sunday April 19, 2020 - 2PM "Music of the Diaspora"

Nina Gordon - cello, Dina Namer - piano

This program will feature rarely performed works by Jewish composers Mario Castelnuovo-Tedesco, Paul Ben-Haim, Freidrich Gernsheim and Pancho Vladigerov. Much of the program is derived from the research of Cellist Nina Gordon, who is on the music faculty at Illinois Wesleyan University, and Ottawa based Dina Namer, who teaches piano at Queens University. Both are featured soloist at Temple Israel's high holiday services.


