From the Pulpit



This is not how we imagined the first months of our year. Over Rosh Hashana, we started to dream... We had put the worst of COVID behind us, and we were emerging with strength.

And then Oct 7th happened. While intending to celebrate the role of Torah in our lives, we were instead shocked to hear of Hamas' terror

spree in our beloved Israel. Since that time we have found ourselves numb, afraid, angry, sad, lost. Important to note, we have also responded with cohesion, resilience, solidarity, love. A few important steps that we've taken as a Temple:

- * Our Shabbat services have been a place to support one another, find balance, and mobilize. Many have come to join us, searching for a safe place in this sensitive time. We've also had a number of allies attend as guests. If you're not a regular, come join us!
- * I've met with each of our TIRS classes, helping them navigate difficult questions, especially that which they are encountering at school. I've affirmed the message of living our Judaism with pride, celebrating Israel as our home, and recognizing Anti Semitic threats. I know we want to shield our kids, but it's important to reinforce these topics at home.
- * We had a psychologist meet with TIRS parents. It was a sensitive conversation looking at fears and concerns at this torturous time. We're also hosting coffee talks at Temple on select Sunday mornings. Temple can be a place to seek solace.
- * Our knitters are hard at work making tugues to send to soldiers, a beautiful demonstration of love. Knitting itself can be therapeutic in these dark days.
- * We're in continuous conversations with our sister congregation in Northern Israel. We had a zoom chat, hearing stories on the ground and offering support. Rabbi Orit Rozenblit will address our community virtually on November 4th at Shabbat services.
- * I've been in touch with our political representatives at all levels and have received their support in many ways, most pertinent affirming our security needs. I was delighted to join an interfaith statement under the leadership of Mayor Sutcliffe.

The challenges are many, but we hold our heads high. Chanukah is approaching, we are reminded of the brave Macabees who sought out light even in the darkness. I pray that by the time December arrives that our kidnapped loved ones will be home, that terror will be supressed, that safety will be ensured for Jews near and far. I recognize each of these asks represent arduous challenges, but we will not let our hopes fade. And as we pursue, we will kindle the flames we hold within and that which we share with our brothers and sisters.

On a lighter note, I hope you will all join me in wishing Heather Cohen a happy retirement. After 34 years at Temple, Heather will be retiring and we will be celebrating her years of service and sending her off in style on November 18th with a special Shabbat service and kiddish lunch following.




Chanukah



CJPAC's Generation: Student Leaders Program is designed specifically for high school students who are politically curious.

This program is open to all Jewish high school students in grades 10-12 (secondary 4 and 5 in Quebec) across Canada. Participants gather monthly throughout the school year for a combination of virtual and in-person sessions, meeting with a variety of experienced and insightful speakers. Participants engage in thoughtful discussions with other young adults that are designed to open the doors to engagement in the democratic process. During these sessions, students enhance their political knowledge, strengthen their voices, and hone their skills. 

In Case You Missed It



Sukkot and National Day for Truth and Reconciliation September 30, 2023

The joy that accompanied what took place during Shabbat services on September 30th has since been encased in the profound sadness and grief over the recent horrific events in Israel. That said, we are still mindful that our congregation marked two important events on that Shabbat - the observance of the holiday of Sukkot and the National Day for Truth and Reconciliation. In his sermon on September 30th, Rabbi Mikelberg linked these two occasions by highlighting the themes of Sukkot: offering thanks for our core blessings and reflecting on life's fragility.

As Jews, as Canadians, and, as friends of Indigenous peoples the Rabbi spoke of our essential and parallel values: community, justice, hospitality, and the importance of education as a central part of remembrance. And it is through education that we show our commitment to advancing reconciliation and renewing our relationships with Indigenous peoples.

This year's calendar provided the unique opportunity to celebrate Sukkot and, simultaneously, as Jews, to honour the children who never returned home and survivors of residential schools, as well as their families and communities. As such, it allowed us to acknowledge the need to make central the devastating attempts to erase Indigenous customs, language, and sense of being. In doing so, we acknowledge that we have much work to do in teaching and learning about this tragic period in Canadian history. The service also provided an invaluable opportunity to build on the legacies of our histories as survivors by creating important connections both through the telling of our stories and by supporting each other in the healing process.

At the end of the Sukkot service, members of the congregation - many of whom were wearing the commemorative orange shirts - were invited into the

Sukkah. There we shared blessings along with bannock and challah concluding what was a meaningful time together.



Warm Hats, Warm Hearts: Temple Israel Knits (and Crochets!) for IDF Soldiers

Seventeen years ago, knitter and Israeli mom Channah Koppel, whose son was serving in the Israel Defence Forces (IDF), mobilized her knitting group, "Chicks with Sticks", to create warm knitted winter hats for IDF soldiers. The idea eventually grew into a global movement, with knitters and crocheters around the world sending the handmade caps to soldiers stationed throughout Israel.

At this time of war in Israel, three hundred thousand reservists have been called up for military duty, many of them "lone soldiers' without family in the country. In recognition of the sacrifice IDF soldiers make for Israel's safety, security, and continued existence, the Jewish community around the world is once again organizing to provide hats for IDF soldiers.



Temple Israel is contributing to this effort. We held a "stitch-in" evening after the Friday Kabbalat service on October 20th. Twelve knitters and crocheters of all experience levels participated. More people came to pick up a skein of black yarn "to go," each promising to produce at least two toques. Hats off to Lisa Hans, who was the first participant to finish a toque during the session!

Please help us keep the momentum going! If you knit or crochet, you can start on your own with the patterns available from the office. If you don't stitch, please consider purchasing and donating black yarn for those who do. * And anyone can host a "Knit Night" or "Crochet Klatch" (plus, it's a great place to learn if you're a newbie!)



There are two "official" drop-off locations for finished hats: in the lobby of Temple Israel and between the doors of the Ottawa Jewish Community Centre. We're hoping to have as many toques as possible deposited in these locations by Thursday, November 2nd. That first batch will be collected and taken to Toronto for flight to Israel that week. But this initiative will be ongoing, so please keep stitching!

*Please note: To comply with the soldiers' requests and army regulations, yarn must be machine washable, plain black worsted weight yarn. Superwash acrylic works well.

Kulanu



We are excited to share that Temple Israel is participating this year in Kulanu, a self-directed program led by ADL that empowers synagogue communities to fight against antisemitism and hate. Kulanu, Hebrew for "all of us," is an eight-month program, running from October 2023 to June 2024, dedicated to empowering congregations to address antisemitism and hate in their communities through education, community engagement, and advocacy.

The Kulanu working group will be composed of seven to ten community members who are committed to leading the work to combat antisemitism in our community. It is important that we have people representing different age groups and identities (race, class, gender, sexuality, disability, socioeconomic status, etc.) on this working group.

The working group will meet approximately 12 times throughout the program to plan activities and take action to combat antisemitism in our community.

As part of our Kulanu work we will:

1. Build a working group.

Establish a working group that reflects the whole community you serve to lead your Kulanu efforts throughout the next eight months. This working group will liaise with ADL and lead the congregation and broader community in at least two activities related to combating antisemitism during the program.

2. Promote incident reporting.

Reporting is key to working together to make our communities safe for all. When congregations report antisemitic incidents to ADL through the designated Kulanu reporting link, we can better help communities across the country by encouraging the appropriate allocation of resources, advocating for stronger protections from incidents and crimes, and assisting targets of bias, bigotry and hate.

3. Implement two activities.

Develop and implement at least two activities that utilize education, advocacy, and community engagement to combat antisemitism in our community.

4. Participate in exclusive programming.

ADL and our synagogue partners regularly hold webinars on countering antisemitism and hate. We encourage you to participate in this exclusive programming, which will include experts on extremism, access to unique speakers, and other opportunities to bring compelling, relevant content back to our synagogue.

5. Engage in a community of practice.

A significant part of the Kulanu experience will entail networking with other synagogues to share best practices, discuss obstacles and challenges, and offer advice from our own experiences.

6. Share impact.

We will provide pictures and testimonials throughout the program and share our successes.

Once these steps are completed, the working group members will submit documentation to ADL and our synagogue. If you are interested in taking part in this initiative, please contact Cathy at *cathy@templeis-raelottawa.com*. We appreciate your investment in this important program.

Kristallnacht: Finding Strength and Inspiration through Reflection and Learning

Don't Miss this Exclusive Virtual Event for Members of Congregations Participating in ADL's Kulanu Program

Join Kulanu congregations from across North America for a virtual learning session and text study marking Kristallnacht, featuring Rabbi David Wolpe, ADL's Rabbinic Fellow. This session will reflect on the events of Kristallnacht through the lens of Jewish thought leaders and foundational texts, offering hope in the face of rising antisemitism and hate today.

Kristallnacht, the night of the broken glass, occurred November 9-10, 1938, when mobs took to the streets of Germany and Austria, committing a wave of violent attacks against the Jewish community including the burning of synagogues, Torah scrolls and holy books, the desecration of Jewish cemeteries and schools and the murder of almost 100 Jews.

As ADL's Rabbinic Fellow, Rabbi David Wolpe serves as a thought leader within the organization, advising on interfaith and intergroup affairs, and sharing his thoughts and reflections with the community at large. Rabbi Wolpe, who has authored eight books, is the Max Webb Emeritus Rabbi of Sinai Temple in Los Angeles and was named the most influential Rabbi in America by Newsweek.




